The Inuit Art Foundation is seeking a Strategic Initiatives Director to join our leadership team. The ideal candidate for this role is an Inuk or Inuvialuk who is passionate about arts and culture, a skilled manager and communicator, visionary thinker and relationship-builder. This position can be filled by someone living anywhere in Canada, including Inuit Nunangat.

The Inuit Art Foundation, established in 1987, is a national arts service organization serving Inuit artists and publisher of the *Inuit Art Quarterly*, the sole magazine dedicated to circumpolar Indigenous art.

The Role

The Strategic Initiatives Director is an integral member of the leadership team, responsible for putting into action the IAF's vision, mission and mandate across the organization and especially through new partnerships. The goal of this position is to cultivate new and nurture existing relationships, create and manage programs to deepen and broaden our impact and guide the organization in the creation and/or refinement of best practices.

The Strategic Initiatives Director will work closely with the Executive Director, the Editorial Director, the Board of Directors, and all staff members to ensure the IAF is best serving its mandate and securing the strongest future possible for Inuit artists.

The Strategic Initiatives Director is able to manage the complexities and opportunities associated with a dynamic and growing team and organization. It is essential that the candidate have previous experience in developing and leading initiatives, and creating partnerships with and for Inuit artists and cultural workers.

Responsibilities:

- Assume a leadership role at the IAF, including representing the organization externally on committees, as well as at events;
- Act as a liaison with government and stakeholder representatives and groups at the municipal, provincial/territorial, and federal levels;
- Create new and support the expansion of existing IAF programs;
- Envision, build and/or revise internal procedures and protocols for all staff based on Inuit Qaujimajatuqangit principles and community best practices;
- Work directly with IAF leadership (staff, board and advisories) to build capacity for programs, partnerships and overall outreach;
- Support operational effectiveness, including the creation of budgets, grant applications and reports and fundraising strategies; and
- Utilize creativity, innovation and business acumen to deliver outstanding results.

Qualifications:

- Proven track record of collaborative and inclusionary leadership;
- Being connected and responsive to diverse Indigenous, and particularly Inuit and Inuvialuit, art communities and having a concrete understanding of the discourses surrounding art and culture;
- Excellent interpersonal, facilitation, communication and team-building skills;



- Demonstrated strong organizational skills with the proven ability to meet deadlines, prioritize multiple competing tasks, and excel in a busy and nuanced environment;
- Previous experience managing staff, including onboarding, performance assessment and providing regular feedback;
- Strong aptitude in written and verbal communication skills including ability to demonstrate tact and diplomacy with varied groups of stakeholders; and
- Demonstrated commitment to collaboration and the ability to tangibly contribute to the reimagining of processes and systems.

The ideal applicant will be an Inuk or Inuvialuk with arts leadership experience. Prior experience with Inuit art will be considered a strong asset. Please note that this position is only open to Inuit and Inuvialuit applicants.

If you don't possess all the skills listed above but are enthusiastic about the position, please don't hesitate to apply. We support diversity and inclusion in our work and are interested in diverse candidates with varied experiences, and not only in those who might fit the description above. Please note that this role may be filled remotely, but the successful applicant must be located and eligible to work within Canada.
